
Geocaching?

Did you know that Hillary House is the site of a geocache? What is a geocache, you ask?

Geocaching is a real-world, outdoor treasure hunting game using GPS-enabled devices. Participants navigate to a specific set of GPS coordinates and then attempt to find the geocache (container) hidden at that location.

In its simplest form, a cache always contains a logbook or log sheet for you to log your find. Larger caches may contain a logbook and any number of items. These items turn the adventure into a true treasure hunt. You never know what the cache owner or visitors to the cache may have left for you to enjoy.

Our cache includes a map of the grounds, guiding you to interesting features of the landscape. We are also including a gift for first time finders. This is a large cache, perfect for beginner geocachers.

Recipe Corner

From the Hillary House Collection

We all seem to be baking these days, so here is an "old favourite" from the Hillary House collection.

Cherry Cobbler

Ingredients

1 can sour red cherries (equals 2-1/2 cups + juice) ½ cup sugar 1 tbsp. cornstarch

½ cup sugar
1 tsp. butter
½ cup milk
1 cup flour
2 tsp. baking powder
Pinch salt

Method

- Mix cherries, sugar, cornstarch in a saucepan
- Bringing to a boil, boil for 1 minute
- Stir constantly
- Pour into a 1-1/2 quart baking dish
- Mix the last six ingredients in a bowl in the order given
- Pour over fruit
- Bake 25-30 minutes at 400°F



French Dressing

Ingredients

1/3 cup sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. paprika
Juice of 1 orange
Juice of 1 lemon
1 tbsp. vinegar
1 cup vegetable oil
1 tsp. grated onion
1 clove garlic minced

Method

Put all in jar. Shake well. Refrigerate until ready to use.
